The Challenge of Wealth

Religion and the Challenge of Philosophy

Dr. Meir Tamari, well-known as an expert in the fields of economics and Jewish law, has written an engaging, in-depth study on the subject of money as it applies to earning and spending, business transactions, financial management, charity, economic morality and immorality, and Judaism's teachings on the use of wealth. Most books dealing with business ethics or economic morality do not emphasize the spiritual aspects of these crucial factors. Rather, they seek to find applications of modern economic theory or present a Jewish legal framework for economic activity. This book emphasizes the idea that concepts of morality and ethics (rather than economic systems) are the real basis for achieving economic justice and a more equitable market. Part I of this study is devoted to moral issues related to the creation of wealth. The author reviews the causes of economic immorality and the solutions offered by religion, free markets, and socialism. He also addresses Jewish spiritual concepts such as kiddush HaShem (sanctifying the name of God) through

economic activity, operating beyond the demands of the law, and the effects of unethical behavior on the individuals who perpetrate it. The author also discusses the biblical injunction against placing a stumbling block in the path of the blind, relating it to the marketing of goods harmful to the buyer, to conflicts of interest, and to those involved in consulting and the marketing of advice. Advertising, consumer protection competition, and government regulation are reviewed in light of the Jewish definitions of honesty and their application to a modern economy. Special attention is paid to Jewish-gentile relationships. Part I concludes with an analysis of the moral obligation of both private and public corporations to adhere to the ethical demands of Judaism. This discussion of the corporate veil in halakhah centers on the rights and obligations of shareholders and executives. Ethical problems in financial management, such as insider trading, leveraged buyouts, and bankruptcy, are reviewed. Part II of the book is devoted to Judaism's teachings on the use of wealth. Acknowledged patterns of consumption, justice, communal demands, and the use of wealth are the factors that largely determine the moral restraints and ethical decisions of both individuals and society. Moral imperatives, however, are not sufficient in Judaism, so that the social obligation of charity, both voluntary and legislated as taxation, has been a characteristic of Jewish life throughout the ages. In the same light as charity, the halakhic treatment of interest forms part of this search for social justice.

Instead of focusing on a few aspects of contemporary civilization, he offers a catholic interpretation of the ways of the world, which subsumes previous attempts to understand the constraints and freedoms of our future. The voluntary cooperation between tens or hundreds of millions of basically egotistical individuals in a democratic society is nothing short of the miraculous, and it should be no surprise that it does not always work. Democracy has failed repeatedly outside its core countries. When we move into the next phase of democratic development, our worst enemy will be complacency. The Challenge of Democracy presents a penetrating analysis of the democratic predicament the historic ties, the driving forces, the threats and opportunities. The personal recollections of the author enliven the text. He combines the different aspects of his subject matter into a coherent worldview, mapping out the dangers ahead. The book proffers both dependable charts and a moral compass for navigating a turbulent future. The outcome is in no way preordained, but depends on every one of us our good will and sense of fair play.

Religion, Morality, and Community in Post-Soviet Societies

Uniquely relevant to a world shaken by recent acts of terror, this provocative analysis of our culture of violence calls people of faith back to the way of peace that has always been the proper Christian response to aggression. With the newspaper in one hand and the Bible in the other, Lee Griffith takes a frank look at the historical events and modern forces that contribute to terrorism. This is not a book about small guerrilla bands of terrorists nor about so-called "Islamic terrorists" -- it is a cogent, open-eyed analysis of a "worldwide epidemic of violence. In a discussion that will no doubt be controversial, Griffith argues that terrorism and counter-terrorism are identical phenomena when viewed at the spiritual level. To oppose terrorism with violence acknowledges the terrorist assumption that meaningful change is only possible through suffering and fear. Likewise, terrorism and counter-terrorism both employ similar God language to justify horrendous acts of violence. This is true not only of "rogue states" but also of Western leaders who use religious language on the eve of battle. In response to today's culture of terror, Griffith points the way to a theology of peace. He first looks at specific current events that contribute to terrorism. Next, he mines the history of the church to see how the tradition has responded to violence in the past. Finally, he probes the biblical texts for meaningful answers. The result is a stirring message for our day: rather than serving as an incitement to violence, the biblical concept of "the terror of God" stands as a renunciation of all violence -- and of death itself. Posing a radical faith for radical times, "The War on Terrorism and the Terror of God is sure to generate discussion from every quarter.

Ezra, Nehemiah, and Esther for Everyone

Winner of the 2013 Christianity Today Book Award for Theology/Ethics Scholars and laypersons alike regard Jonathan Edwards (1703-58) as North America's greatest theologian. The *Theology of Jonathan Edwards* is the most comprehensive survey of his theology yet produced and the first study to make full use of the recently-completed seventy-three-volume online edition of the Works of Jonathan Edwards. The book's forty-five chapters examine all major aspects of Edwards's thought and include in-depth discussions of the extensive secondary literature on Edwards as well as Edwards's own writings. Its opening chapters set out Edwards's historical and personal theological contexts. The next thirty chapters connect Edwards's theological loci in the temporally-ordered way in which he conceptualized the theological enterprise—beginning with the triune God in eternity with his angels to the history of redemption as an expression of God's inner reality *ad extra*, and then back to God in eschatological glory. The authors analyze such themes as aesthetics, metaphysics, typology, history of redemption, revival, and true virtue. They also take up such rarely-explored topics as Edwards's missiology, treatment of heaven and angels, sacramental thought, public theology, and views of non-Christian religions. Running throughout the volume are what the authors identify as five basic theological constituents: trinitarian communication, creaturely participation, necessitarian dispositionalism, divine priority, and harmonious constitutionalism. Later chapters trace his influence on and connections with later theologies and philosophies in America and Europe. The result is a multi-layered analysis that treats Edwards as a theologian for the twenty-first-century global Christian community, and a bridge between the Christian West and East, Protestantism and Catholicism, conservatism and liberalism, and charismatic and non-charismatic churches.
